## MPA Congratulates 3 New APA Fellows and 2 New APA Distinguished Fellows

APA alerted the DB's this week that there was a 96% approval rate this year for the Distinguished Fellow/Distinguished Life Fellow/International Distinguished Fellow nominations this year, which is consistent with previous years. MPA is honored that Doctors *Saurabh Bhardwj*, *Clyde Glenn* and *Tongi Shavers* will receive their Fellowship and Doctors *Maxie Gordon* and *Mark Ladner* were selected as Distinguished Fellows. ## MPA Private Practice Committee Seeking Input from Membership

Per the MPA Private Practice Committee, providers are having a very difficult time with Walgreens. The chain made an edict that they would not fill stimulants if the physician was 50 miles distant from where the prescription is being filled, usually in the patient's hometown. In addition, Walgreens at times may be the only pharmacy in the area with the stimulant in stock or available. They have since changed this to leaving it totally at the discretion of the pharmacist to fill or refuse to fill the prescription, regardless of the clinical situation. A specific provider has had difficulty with one prescription for Paxil that is due for a refill on Christmas Day and the pharmacist would not allow an early refill, even though by law (we believe) they can fill up to 3 days early and told the patient he could pick it up on Dec. 26. Supposedly, this all stems from Walgreens being hit with a large fine by the DEA for using pharmacy techs to fill controlled substances with no pharmacist in the building. This has been increasingly frustrating for physicians, patients, and pharmacists as we

# APA President Says Financial Concerns Are Number One Anxiety-Provoking Issue For Holidays

The <u>AP</u> (12/21, Morga ) reports, "The holidays are supposed to be a joyful time, but they can also be financially stressful. With gifts, social gatherings and plane tickets home, the costs can start piling up." The AP adds, "Household expenses continue to rise and many Americans are expressing concern about their financial futures, according to a poll from The Associated Press-NORC Center for Public Affairs Research." American Psychiatric Association President Dr. Petros Levounis said, "Financial concerns are the number one anxiety-provoking issue (for the holidays)." The article discusses "recommendations from experts to reduce financial stress during the holidays."

## 52 Weeks of Progress

Each week this year, DMH will be highlighting a specific service or program to increase awareness of services and supports available across Mississippi. Our hope is by the end of 2023, you will know more about offerings in your state through seeing these highlights - 52 Weeks of Progress. This week, we highlight supported employment for transition aged youth.

In 2023, DMH applied for and was accepted to be one of seven states to participate in a Policy Academy on Supported Employment for Transition Aged Youth in Rockville, Maryland at the SAMHSA national offices. Mississippi's team included representation from NAMI, the Department of Child Protection Services, the Department of Human Services, the Department of Education, the

Department of Rehabilitation Services, and the Department of Employment Security. The other selected states included Alaska, Illinois, Ohio, Oklahoma, South Carolina, and Utah.

The Policy Academy is a learning collaborative that lasts a full 12 months, with the ultimate goal of developing a state-wide strategic plan to advance policies and practices around Supported Employment services for youth aged 16-24, particularly those who are transitioning out of foster care, from juvenile detention facilities, are living with disabilities, or face other challenges. All of those states met again for a virtual session with SAMHSA in September, with the individual state teams meeting on their own throughout the year. In addition, DMH received a federal Transformation Transfer Initiative (TTI) grant to help further these efforts in 2024.

#### Case of the Quarter: Dr. Jones v. Medical Board

The "Case of the Quarter" column is a sample case study that highlights best practices in actual scenarios encountered through <u>PRMS' extensive experience in litigation and claims management</u>. Specific names and references have been altered to protect clients' interests. This discussion is for informational and education purposes only and should not be relied upon as legal advice.

#### Facts:

Dr. Jones received notice that her state's Medical Board was investigating a complaint filed against her. The complaint alleged that she was not competent to practice medicine. The complaint cited examples of Dr. Jones frequently writing orders on the wrong patient; having moments during conversations when she blanks out; and forgetting to return calls to patient and other providers. The Board requested a written response from Dr. Jones and copies of her medical records for the past two years. Dr. Jones knows that she has moments of forgetfulness but feels certain that she can still safely practice medicine. She prepares her response and sends it to the Board along with copies of her medical records. The Board has a psychiatrist review the case and then asked Dr. Jones to come in for an interview. Dr. Jones does not appear for the interview and does not respond to any further correspondence from the Board. The Board revokes Dr. Jones' license. Dr. Jones reports the matter to her insurance carrier.

#### Allegation:

The allegation is that Dr. Jones is not competent to safely practice medicine.

#### Defense:

While a defense might have been developed or alternatives to revocation negotiated, Dr. Jones' failure to respond to the Board and to timely report the matter to her insurance carrier eliminated exploration of these possibilities.

#### Outcome:

Once Dr. Jones' license was revoked, she had to abruptly close her practice and her professional liability insurance was cancelled since she was no longer licensed to practice. Since she reported the Board's investigation prior to cancellation of her policy, her insurance carrier appointed an attorney to represent her in appealing the Board's decision. However, the Board did not change its determination.

#### Take Away:

Report any Board investigation to your insurance carrier immediately so that coverage can be determined and an attorney, well-versed in dealing with the Board, can defend you. Further, if you have any concerns about your competency to continue safely practicing medicine, consider what steps you may need to take to protect your patients and yourself.

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#### 3) ASSOCIATE PROGRAM DIRECTOR POSITION AT MISSISSIPPI STATE HOSPITAL

Mississippi State Hospital (MSH) is seeking to fill its vacant Associate Program Director position within its Psychiatry Residency Program. MSH is a licensed 382-bed state psychiatric hospital which is accredited by The Joint Commission and located in Rankin County, Mississippi. The hospital's dedicated patient care staff consists of highly skilled and caring

medical professionals, nurses, behavioral health staff, social workers, and support staff who work together to provide patient-centered care on a daily basis. Services provided include: adult and child/adolescent psychiatric treatment, substance use disorder treatment, as well as treatment provided for forensic patients.

Further, MSH promotes educational growth within the psychiatric field through its ACGME accredited psychiatry residency program as well as through other educational ventures and partnerships it has with entities such as nursing schools and psychology departments throughout the country.

The Associate Residency Program Director is an integral role and includes the following responsibilities:

- Maintain and develop resident training curricula in accordance with the ACGME's Common Program Requirements (CPR) and Professional Standards and Requirements (PSR).
- Formulate goals and objectives for each clinical rotation as outlined by the CPR.
- Participate in site visits and surveys.
- Ensure the quality of didactic and clinical education at sites participating in the program by monitoring the clinical learning and working environment (CLER) at all participating sites.
- Assure compliance of participating sites with ACGME requirements.
- Serve as the course director as assigned by the Residency Program Director (PD) and provide didactic lectures.
- Serve on the Clinical Competence Committee (CCC), Program Evaluation Committee (PEC), the Recruitment and Selection Committee, and the Graduate Medical Education Executive Committee (GMEC).
- Coordinate outpatient experiences for PGY-3 and PGY-4 residents with various local mental health centers.

Minimum Qualifications: Verifiable Doctor of Medicine Degree or Doctor of Osteopathic Medicine Degree from an accredited medical school; completion of a psychiatry residency program; a verifiable current, unrestricted license to practice medicine in the State of Mississippi; and board certification in psychiatry. The applicant must submit at least three references from peers.

Benefits: No after-hours call and no weekend call.

A physician working as an employee (not on contract) will receive benefits of health insurance, paid leave (personal, medical, and holiday), and participation in PERS (retirement system).

Prior to an offer of employment, the applicant must provide a copy of a current Mississippi Medical License, have satisfactory results from a criminal background check and have satisfactory results from a urine drug screen.
