### This Week at the Mississippi Legislature



When Dr. Hannah Richard and Dr. Zac Robinson, (MSH Psych Residents) pictured left with Senate Pro Temp Dean Kirby, signed up to be Doctor of the Day at the MS Capitol on Wednesday, they had no idea what the day would bring. Several groups had planned press conferences throughout the week to focus attention on Medicaid expansion. But Wednesday's press conference hosted by religious leaders around the state turned into a

secondary health care event. MPA is featuring these two health care heroes this week.

"We could hear a loud man's voice throughout the hallways, which we later discovered was a press conference on the stairs of the Capitol led by pastors across the state of Mississippi. The nurse left the clinic stating she wanted to see what the commotion was about. Moments later, the nurse ran back in to grab Dr. Robinson and me stating "man down on the second floor." I

grabbed the AED beside me, and we ran up the stairs as the nurse grabbed the vitals machine and came up behind us on the elevator. When I got to the second floor, there were a bunch of men actively taking the collapsed man to a nearby cushioned bench and they laid him out. The man was completely unresponsive and not breathing. I confirmed with a bystander that 911 had been called. There was another bystander that happened to be a nurse who was very helpful in the situation. She immediately jumped to action and started performing chest compressions. The first round of compressions gave me enough time to open the AED and get the pads on his chest that the others had helped expose. The AED did not recommend shock and chest compressions were resumed by the nurse per the order of the AED. During the second round, the man let out a big breath and his eyes started tracking movement. About this time, the vitals machine had arrived to us, and we were able to confirm stable HR and blood pressure. O2 was unable to be measured as the machine was malfunctioning. The man became more alert and started verbalizing in one-to-two-word phrases. I staved beside him, listening to what he had to say until help arrived. The entire time we were surrounded by a prayer circle led by the other local pastors there for the press conference. The paramedics got him strapped the board and carried him down the Capitol steps to the ambulance. On his way out, he was alert enough to wave at us and give us a thumbs up. We later learned the good news that he was recovering well with his family by his side at Baptist. It's an experience I will not soon forget." (Dr.Richard)

"Serving as the Doctor of the Day at the capitol is an honor and opportunity provided by MSMA. Usually, we help the people with allergies or minor aches, and in return get to know our representatives and advocate for our patients and profession. Occasionally, we are called upon for a true medical emergency. This week a pastor taking time to talk with representatives about Medicaid went unresponsive during a press conference. The nurse grabbed me and Dr. Richard, and we were able to resuscitate the patient after two rounds of CPR. It was a day that demonstrated the value of having rapid access to medical professionals. Luckily the pastor was able to recover and should be back to preaching in no time. I look forward to future opportunities to serve as Doctor of the Day though hope for much less excitement." ## THREE THINGS TO KNOW ABOUT: EHRS – LIABILITY FOR ACTS OF OTHERS

 Before aligning yourself professionally with anyone, you should perform a thorough vetting of each individual whether they are an employee, someone with whom you supervise/collaborate, or merely share office space. As appropriate, verify that person's education, licensing status and board complaints, certification, CE hours, employment history, malpractice history, a credit check, and a criminal background check. And of course remember to never employ or a current or former patient.

- 2. One of the acts by office staff for which a psychiatrist may be found liable is the failure to timely release a patient's medical record upon receipt of a valid request. Most states, as well as federal HIPAA law require that records be released within a specific time frame which may be as short as 10 days. In the converse, psychiatrists may be liable for an employee's inappropriate disclosure of information which may include the inappropriate release of records or verbal disclosure of patient/treatment information and inappropriate access to PMP data by a physician's delegate is another act for which a psychiatrist may be found liable.
- 3. When sharing office space, avoid the appearance of any control of or supervision of your office mates. Eliminate as many objective indicators of association as possible. This might include shared outdoor signs, letterhead, office telephone numbers, billing personnel, etc. Courts consider the *perception* of patients in determining whether a treatment relationship has been created and/or exists. Your very presence in a shared office may be the only factor that leads a person to believe that you associate with, employ, control or supervise your office mate(s); however, you risk being held liable if a court finds the patient's perception to have been reasonable.

### Contact Your Representative to Prevent Cuts to Physician Reimbursement

The Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) approved a 3.4% reduction in Medicare's physician payments for 2024. This cut is devastating to physician practices and the patients they care for, and could necessitate reduced staffing and office closures, disproportionately harming rural and underserved communities. Please urge Congress to prevent these devastating cuts from going into effect by cosponsoring the Preserving Seniors' Access to Physicians Act of 2023 (H.R.6683). This bipartisan bill would completely eliminate the 3.4% physician pay cut expected to take effect on January 1. Learn more and compose a message to your representative in Congress here.
